WHAT DOESHERMENTHINK ABOUT MARINE RESERVES?

FISHERMEN ARE CONCERNED ABOUT MARINE RESERVES

Human dimensions research starts conversations with fishermen. It gives them a chance to share perspectives on their businesses, fishing practices, and future expectations.


Many fishermen are concerned with the implementation of marine reserves in Oregon. In interviews and survey research, they have asked: What are the real motivations underlying the marine reserves? What future conservation plans will affect their livelihood? This uncertainty makes it difficult for fishermen to make decisions about their businesses and plan for the future.

FISHERMEN'S CONCERNS

In interviews, most fishermen said they were unclear about the science behind the marine reserves.

In one study, only 10% of fishermen thought marine reserves were productive management tools; and 40% thought marine reserves were implemented for political reasons.

Are marine reserves productive for resource management?





FINDING A WAY FORWARD

Despite periods of distrust, emerging data suggests that there is increased willingness among fishermen to collaborate with scientists. Many fishermen believe that their knowledge and expertise can improve marine science. We recommend that future marine scientific research draw on this vast expertise.
